



KNOW WHAT'S AVAILABLE RIGHT NOW

The "Available Now" button on the Libby home screen lets you know what you snap up right now, no hassle. Even better? The "available now" filter in the search. This removes anything with a hold and shows only what can be checked out right now.

SKIP THE LINE

We have almost 300 titles in our Lucky Day Collection — and none of them have a wait time!

EAGLE EYES

If you're on the hunt for the newest titles, check if it's a "coming soon" title. It can be a little easy to miss even though it's just above the title. You can place a hold before the book is officially available!



NO-HOLDS HOOPLA

Last but not least, be sure to check Hoopla, especially for new or hot titles. These are the titles most likely to have holds in Overdrive because they're popular. But if it's on Hoopla, it will be available because everything on Hoopla is available!

LETTER FROM THE CEO



want to take this opportunity to thank the entire Baltimore community for seven wonderful years. I am stepping down to become the CEO of the King County Public Library in Washington state, one of the largest circulating libraries in the country. Leading the Pratt Library has been one of the most humbling, fulfilling, and joyful experiences of my life. Each one of you made me feel at home in Baltimore and I'm proud of all that we've accomplished. Darcell Graham, the Pratt's Vice President of Public Services, will serve as Interim Chief Executive Officer and I will work with her over the coming months to ensure a seamless transition. Darcell has been with the Pratt for more than 25 years and I know she will be a strong and visionary leader as the Pratt undertakes a nationwide search for a permanent CEO in the new year.

During my tenure at the Pratt, we've achieved many important milestones together. The Central Library reopened after an historic renovation. We will break ground this year on the Pratt's first new library building in 15 years in Park Heights. The Pratt created new, innovative services through the COVID-19 pandemic that enabled ongoing access for our community. A new Master Facilities Plan is in its final stages to ensure the Pratt's ability to serve generations to come. With so much to celebrate, last year, the Pratt had the highest circulation in 12 years, a record number of active cardholders, and the highest number of new cardholders in seven years. I want to thank you for all you've done to help the Pratt reach new heights and be a leader for libraries nationwide.

I'm confident that the Pratt will continue to reach new goals with the leadership of Interim CEO Darcell Graham. She has worked across nearly all of the public service divisions at the Pratt and has a keen understanding of our shared vision and commitments. That work includes an historic American Rescue Plan investment in many Pratt buildings, productive collective bargaining negotiations with Pratt staff, and a new five-year strategic plan that will be rolled out in the new year.


The Moment by Bakari Sellers





Table for Two by Amor Towles




