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

BALTIMORE CITY CHROMEBOOK DISTRIBUTION

In partnership with Baltimore City Information & Technology and the Maryland Office of Statewide Broadband, the Pratt Library will be distributing 30,000 HP Chromebooks to eligible Baltimore City households. Distribution events will be held at various Pratt locations and local community sites. Through the Maryland Connected Devices Program (MD-CDP), efforts will continue to decrease the digital divide and increase digital literacy in the Baltimore City community.



ELIGIBILITY

Only Baltimore City residents 18 years or older may participate. One device is allowed per household.

In order to pick up your Chromebook, you must provide:

- Photo ID (driver's license, state ID, work or government ID, passport, etc.)
- Proof of Baltimore City residence
- Proof of one of the following qualifications listed below

QUALIFICATIONS

Households with an income at or below 200% of the Federal Poverty Guidelines:

- \$27,180 for a household of 1
- \$36,620 for a household of 2
- \$46,060 for a household of 3
- \$55,500 for a household of 4
- Or \$9,440 more for each additional household member

Households enrolled in the federal Affordable Connectivity Program (ACP).

Households that participate in government assistance programs such as:

- Child receives free or reduced-price school lunch
- Federal Public Housing Assistance (FPHA)
- Medicaid
- Pell Grant (current award year)
- SNAP, formerly Food Stamps
- Supplemental Security Income (SSI)
- Veterans Pension and Survivors Benefit
- WIC

Examples of proof include (but are not limited to) a proof of benefit like your SNAP or Medicaid card, your internet bill showing the ACP discount, or the first page of your most recent tax return.

If you are not eligible or do not meet the qualifications for this distribution, the Pratt still has you covered. Chromebooks may be borrowed from any location by customers 13 or older with a Pratt Library card.

The Uncommon Case of Daniel Brown

Historian Gordon Shufelt will discuss race and policing in late-

19th-century Baltimore. In 1875, an Irish-born Baltimore policeman, Patrick McDonald, entered the home of Daniel Brown, an African American laborer, and clubbed and shot Brown, who died within an hour of the attack. In similar cases at the time, authorities routinely exonerated Maryland law enforcement officers who killed African Americans, usually without serious inquiries into the underlying facts. But in this case, Baltimore's white community chose a different path.


Iron Flame by Rebecca Yarros




The Lost Cause by Cory Doctorow


The Vulnerables by Sigrid Nunez


Class by Stephanie Land


The Little Liar by Mitch Albom



Q&A WITH THE AUTHOR

What's your reaction to your book being named 2023's One Book Baltimore?

It made me feel really good to see that OBB had chosen Before the Ever After. It's a book that's close to my heart.

You found your love of writing at a young age. What's your advice to young people out there who have that same passion?

Be fearless. Write everyday and know that your stories are stories the world is waiting for and won't be able to read until you write them... and write them well. Writing them well means rewriting them, reading them out loud, then more rewriting. Find other folks who love words and write together, share your work, read and talk about writers you love who have gotten to the place you want to get to. Writing is a muscle — the more you use it, the stronger it gets.

This book deals with a 12-year-old boy's confusion and worry as his father goes through a health crisis. How do you hope this book speaks to middle schoolers?

It's a story every young person knows some part of - be it the friendship that gives ZJ strength, the mother that continues to love and nurture him through the crisis, the town that remains beautiful and constant no matter what happens, the music that allows for conversation, bonding, love. I hope every reader who comes to the book finds a part of themselves inside of it and feels seen.

During the story, particularly early on, ZJ grapples with living in his father's shadow. What lessons do you hope teen readers take from the story about becoming their own person?

I never write to try to teach. I write because I myself want to learn and in writing Before the Ever After, I learned a lot about the power of legacy and what it means to lose a person piece by piece. I learned the importance of being in the moment, of telling the people you love that you love them while they're still able to hear/understand what you're saying. I learned that at the end of the day, you are who you are and in that person, something amazing has already begun to live.

ZJ loves to tell stories, both about his friends and retelling stories his father has told him. What role do you think storytelling plays in our everyday lives? Do you see it playing special roles for people undergoing trauma like ZJ's family?

In my TED talk, I talk about the power of story — how we have had it since the beginning of time and even the story of the beginning of time is... a story that we share. Story helps us remember. It helps us understand who we are and how we've become so. This is why the stories of Black and Brown people are being challenged, silenced, snatched from classrooms and libraries — because if we know our history, if we know what we've gone through and survived, we are stronger. Better. More clear about where we're going.

And so much of history for folks of the Global Majority has trauma laced through it so yes, story does place a special role. Being able to laugh about something that happened. Being able to talk about a person who has moved on to the next place with love. Being able to remember a moment from our past and feel grateful that we've gotten through it. All of that is story. And having story in our lives... well, it just helps us breathe better.



Project ENCORE is a transformative restorative justice initiative dedicated to breaking down institutional obstacles and societal reintegration hurdles that contribute to reoffending. Our mission is to empower formerly incarcerated individuals by equipping them with the essential tools to thrive as productive members of society. We adopt a comprehensive approach by seamlessly connecting participants with Pratt's existing wrap-around services, including housing, substance abuse rehabilitation, social work, and more, addressing their mental, emotional, financial, and physical well-being. Our multi-tiered approach is designed to:

- Foster generational wealth and leave a lasting legacy.
- Provide a stable source of income for participants.
- Offer support for housing and transportation needs.
- Create safe, inclusive spaces for open dialogue about barriers and mental health challenges.
- Enhance self-esteem and boost participants' sense of pride and self-worth.

SERVICES:

WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT

The Career Connection Program (CCP) will provide employment opportunities through two pathways. The internal pathway will conduct a 6 month apprentice program for women employment beginning within 30 days of release in partnership with DLLR and Maryland Correctional Institute for Women. Upon successful completion, participants will become permanent Pratt employees. The external pathway will provide employment opportunities through partnerships with local businesses and organizations for those released within 3 – 9 months.
