

LETTER FROM THE INTERIM CEO



t's a season of transition at the Pratt Library. Back in March, our former CEO Heidi Daniel left to lead a library system in Washington state. I've been honored to step into the Interim CEO role. The Pratt Library has been my home for the past 25 years. I've worked across every public service division in this library system. I know how important this library is to both Baltimore and the state of Maryland. The Pratt Library Boards of Trustees and Directors have formed an Executive Search Committee and engaged a national search firm. I am confident that our Executive Administrative team will be able to seamlessly continue the work of the Pratt as decisions are made about future leadership.

While the Pratt is recognized throughout Baltimore and Maryland for the work we do

in our community, the Library is also receiving national recognition. The Institute of Museum and Library Services has named the Enoch Pratt Free Library a finalist for the National Medal, the nation's highest honor. The Pratt is among 30 finalists and the only institution in Maryland to receive this recognition.
