LETTER FROM THE CEO



When I first arrived in Baltimore late last year, I was stopped nearly every day by someone who wanted to tell me their Pratt Library story. Perhaps it was a mother who went to the Govans Branch as a child and now takes her children there for story time, or a man who got help from Pratt staff to build his first resume. And recently, during one of my community town halls, I heard from someone who returned to the Library after the Pratt went fine free a few years ago. I love hearing these stories. They demonstrate that our work is meaningful, and we truly are an institution "for all, rich and poor without distinction of race or color."

So, it's not surprising that customers have voiced concern regarding decisions being made in D.C. and how recent funding cuts may impact our services. The federal government, through an Executive Order from President Donald J. Trump, is working to eliminate the Institute of Museum and Library Services which provides funding to organizations such as the Pratt Library. Historically, federal funds have represented a very small portion of the Pratt's budget, but that doesn't mean that we aren't feeling the repercussions of these new policies.

So, what does this mean for the Enoch Pratt Free Library? It means it is more important than ever for us to provide educational resources, social impact programming, workforce development, internet access, civic engagement, and more. During this time of uncertainty and division in our country, libraries must remain accessible, democratic spaces available to EVERYONE.

We want to be a resource for those facing harsh realities right now — it's why we have immigration resources available at our Southeast Anchor Library, free groceries at our Pratt Free Market, and social workers available at branches providing respite and resources for families. For those looking for a new job, the Library can help with resume writing, interviewing techniques, and one-on-one appointments with career coaches. And, of course, we are open and available. A place where you can come and go as you please, free to explore and read whatever you like.

In this challenging time, we are particularly grateful for the support we receive from the State of Maryland and the City of Baltimore, as well as from individuals, corporations, and foundations. It's what allows us to be the Library our community needs and deserves.

I'm so proud to lead this organization alongside such a dedicated staff, but the Library belongs to all of you. I hope to see you at one of our programs soon!
