






The World We Make by N.K. Jemison

Marie Kondo's Kurashi by Marie Kondo



YOUR PRATT JOURNEY

SHAN'S JOURNEY

As a child I split my childhood between many different neighborhoods from Walbrook Junction and Park Heights to Darley Park and Greenmount West. While living in both East and West Baltimore, I found myself always visiting the Enoch Pratt Free Library. I remember as a young child attending Cecil Elementary, I fell in love with poetry, drawing, and reading. Every year in grade school, there were scholastic book fairs, and with my book money provided by my grandparents Doris and Walter Harris, I would



always buy one or two *Captain Underpants* books. By next week, I would have finished those books.

Still eager to read more *Captain Underpants*, the one place I knew I could go was the Pratt Library, particularly the Clifton Park branch. My grandmother and I would walk together and then eventually I would start going alone or with friends. I remember passing through the neighborhoods of East Baltimore, seeing the dark-skin and tall mechanic with the bright-red corvette playing music so loud the ground would shake, and the older Veterans on the block wearing Kangol hats smoking cigars while sitting on their Lincoln town cars and Cadillacs talking about the wars they've fought in.

Walking through these neighborhoods to the Library you're bound to live many different lives. But the real entry to the portal of life was through the doors of the Pratt Library, and for me it was the Clifton Park branch. Every time I walked through those doors, I felt like I was being introduced to a different world, a world different than Walbrook Junction or Park Heights or Darley Park or Greenmount West, and much different than the neighborhoods I walked through to get to the Library. As a child, the Library was my home away from home. It was the seed I needed to be the artist and human I am now.

The Baltimore Living Archives artist residency in collaboration with the Enoch Pratt Library and SNF Parkway Theater has brought me back to the Library. I've spent the last year and a half finding inspiration, reading and researching LGBTQ history in periodicals, teaching photography workshops to teens, portrait sessions, collage workshops, allowing my creative pursuits to lead me to the next activity or program. I've been fortunate to bring my studio practice to the Library's second floor where I've welcomed visitors to walk in and see what I'm working on or see a recent discovery in the Library's collection, and even participate in oral history projects.

Spending this time at the Library has completely transformed my practice, inspiring me to allow my practice to be more democratic and attentive. I've returned to a place that has always artistically encouraged me. My favorite is walking through the Library heading to my studio, bearing witness to how many lives the library is changing and how many of us get to live through literature, music, and each other.

SHAN Wallace is an award-winning visual artist, photographer, and educator. She is currently an artist in residence as part of the Baltimore Living Archives.

O&A WITH THE AUTHOR

What does it mean to have Furia chosen as the One Book Baltimore selection?

I was so excited when I heard the news! It's a tremendous honor that Furia would be recognized and chosen among so many possible books. I'm very grateful that this story of my heart will be shared with so many students!

What inspired the creation of this novel?

I have always loved fútbol (soccer) and even though I left Rosario 25 years ago to go to college, Rosario is always in my heart. I was inspired by the people around me, the love of the game, and the examples of persistence and resilience that I saw growing up.

Is there anything from your personal life and experience that is featured in the book? Furia isn't an autobiographical novel. However, like Camila, I too grew up in the 7 de Septiembre neighborhood and attended an all-girls school. And like her, I'm a rabid Rosario Central fan.

Representation is so important in young people's literature. What has it meant to you? What does it mean to see the impact this book has had?

It's always such a surreal experience to see how much of an impact it's had around the world. I love that I had the opportunity to share my Argentine, fútbol culture with those who weren't familiar with it, and I'm also humbled and moved at seeing how important it's been for those who share my background. To think that these characters that lived in my imagination for so long now belong to all readers is a privilege I never take for granted.

What do you hope students take away from reading the book?

I never go into a story hoping to teach a lesson, but I hope that *Furia* is both a mirror and/ or a window (to quote Dr. Ruby Sims-Bishop) in which readers can either see their own experiences, or have a peek into someone else's life and reality. I hope readers feel my love for the game, my country, and my culture, and that they're inspired to tell their own stories too.

HELPING PEOPLE WHERE THEY ARE

Another season of Social Worker in the Library is back at the Enoch Pratt Free Library. The Pratt is hosting graduate student interns from University of Maryland School of Social Work and Morgan State University at six library branches.

During the month of September alone, the social work interns helped 111 library customers in-person, and another 76 through virtual appointments with issues like housing or food insecurity, mental health services, reentry resources, and more.

Here are just a few of the success stories from this life-changing program.

CROSSING THE STREET

Last fall, Donald Taylor contacted Social Worker in the Library to help him get a job as a crossing guard. The retired painter's aunt had been a crossing guard when he was growing up, and he always wanted to be one. Pratt social worker Mariel Sass helped him set up an email address and complete the online application. She helped guide him through the onboarding process for the job, and even went to visit him at his crosswalk. Congrats Mr. Taylor!

BRIDGING THE GAP

A Pratt social worker recently helped support a single mother who'd lost her job. The social worker helped her obtain SNAP benefits and medicaid for herself and her son. She sent this email as thanks: "When I was unemployed I didn't see how we were going to make it. You made the difference. Thank you for all you do." The mother recently found a new job.

LIGHTING THE WAY

A Romanian family seeking asylum in the U.S. had their electricity turned off because of a bill they couldn't pay while they're unable to receive work authorization. Pratt's social worker helped them fill out a utility assistance application and schedule a same-day appointment with the Communication Action Partnership Center. Their lights are now back on, and they were able to get assistance with the balance of their bill.
