Abstract	The Kenneth Rede Papers contains manuscripts, correspondence, and scrapbooks of Rede's work about the life and writings of Edgar Allan Poe. The scrapbooks are noteworthy as one of them pertains to a manuscript by Rede about Poe.

Biographical/Historical note

Kenneth Rede was a nationally known authority on the writings and life of Edgar Allan Poe as well as president of the Edgar Allan Poe Society at the time of his death. He had written many book reviews for the Baltimore Evening Sun and special articles for the Baltimore Sunday Sun on subjects pertaining to Poe's life, works and family.

Rede was born to a Dr. Wyllys and Carolyn Rede in Atlanta, Georgia, yet was raised in Brunswick, Georgia, where he spent the first four years of elementary school. His family later moved to Quincy, Illinois, where he finished grammar school. From Quincy, the family moved to Trappe, Maryland, where Rede attended high school at Trappe High School and then later, at the Friends School and Mt. Vernon College in Baltimore, the school his father owned. The school would later close in 1925.

He attended college at the Johns Hopkins University and graduated in 1922, with a bachelor of science. He majored in English and minored in History. He went on to become the principal of Mt. Vernon College, where he also taught English and History. He would then become principal and educational director of the Point Breeze Club Evening School in 1930. Rede died of pneumonia on Nov. 21, 1934, at the age of 37.

Scope and Contents note

The Kenneth Rede collection includes manuscripts, correspondence and scrapbooks of Rede's work as a reviewer, writer and collector of Edgar Allan Poe material. This collection complements the already strong presence of Poe material in the library's Special Collections Department. Overall, the materials are mostly handwritten or typewritten letters as well as manuscripts that are in remarkable shape. Rede took care of the meticulous order of his papers. The original order of the scrapbooks has been maintained though the covers had to be discarded.

Arrangement note

The Kenneth Rede Collection is not arranged into series due to its size. Folder level descriptions are given in the container list on the following pages.

Box 1 contains correspondence, reviews, manuscripts, etc., regarding Poe's writings.

Box 2 contains a scrapbook of the performance of “Politian” at Goucher College in Feb. 1933. “Politian” was a play written by Edgar Allan Poe, based on a real-life event in modern times, set in ancient Rome. The scrapbook was kept in its original order, with correspondence divided by years. Within the correspondence, letters were arranged according to date.

Box 3 contains a scrapbook pertaining to the manuscript of “A Census of First Editions and Source Materials by or Relating to Edgar Allan Poe in American Public and Private Collections,” by Rede. This anthology would be issued in three volumes and was considered a very thorough and complete source for Poe materials. The scrapbook, again, was kept in its original order, with correspondence arranged according to date.
