**Abstract** The Richard Malcolm Johnston Collection ranges in date from 1841-1935,

though the bulk of the collection is dated from the 1880s. This collection provides an excellent study of Johnston's writings and his influence in the literary world. The original manuscripts and drafts of speeches capture Johnston's progression to his final, published product. The correspondence with friends and his family members provides a rich detail of the life

Johnston led and his impact on the literary world. Also included are

ephemera and published works.

## Biographical note

Richard Malcolm Johnston was born on March 8, 1822 on the family plantation, "Oak Grove," near Powelton, Ga. He was the son of Malcolm, a planter and ordained Baptist preacher, and Catherine Davenport. Johnston graduated from Mercer University, Penfield (now at Macon), in 1841. He taught for a year and then practiced law until 1857 when he accepted the position of the chair of rhetoric and belles-lettres at the University of Georgia. From 1862 to 1867 he conducted a school for boys at Rockby, Ga. Johnston instituted an "honor system," instead of harsh physical punishments often used for discipline at the time. The school remained open during the Civil War, even as Johnston served on the staff of General J.E. Brown and helped organize the state militia.

After the War, Johnston moved the school to Baltimore under the name of Pen Lucy School. One of his teachers was Sidney Lanier, the famed poet. Lanier, along with Baltimore publisher Henry C. Turnball, encouraged Johnston to write for publication. Johnston, although over 50 years old at the time, sent his stories to the Southern Magazine. Johnston's story-telling, filled with kindness, humor, morality, and love for the South, became immediately popular. His first book, the Dukesborough Tales, was published in 1871. Some of his other published works Life of Alexander H. Stephens (1878); Old Mark Langston (1884); Two Gray Tourists (1885); Ogeechee Cross-Firings (1889); Widow Guthrie (1890); The Primes and Their Neighbors (1891); Mr. Billy Downs and His Likes (1892); Mr. Fortner's Marital Claims (1892); Little Ike Templin (1894); Old Times in Middle Georgia (1897); Pearce Amerson's Will (1898); and Autobiography of Col. Richard Malcolm Johnston (1900).

Johnston also delivered numerous lectures at St. Mary's Seminary, Notre Dame College of Maryland, and St. Charles' College in Ellicott City, Md. From 1895 to 1898, he was a member of the regular staff of lecturers at the Catholic Summer School located in Plattsburg, N. Y. He was also a popular reader and lecturer in the eighties and nineties when the lyceum system flourished throughout the country. He lectured with several contemporary humorists--once, in 1889, with Mark Twain, who was the guest of the Johnstons in Baltimore.

In 1844 he married Mary Frances Mansfield of New Haven, CN. They had seven children. In 1875, he was received into the Catholic Church. He died September 23, 1898 in Baltimore. (Biography taken largely from the Dictionary of American Biography Base Set.)

## **Scope and Contents**

The Richard Malcolm Johnston Collection ranges in date from 1841-1935, though the bulk of the collection is dated from the 1880s. The Collection is divided into five series: I. Manuscripts, 1891-1896;

II. Addresses given by Richard Malcolm Johnston, 1841-1887; III. Correspondence, 1874-1917; IV. Ephemera of Richard Malcolm Johnston, 1844-1935; and V. Published Works, 1860-1902.

### **Arrangement**

I Manuscripts, 1891-1896 This first series consists of original drafts of Johnston's written works. Only a few of the works are dated and some of the materials are untitled. The series is arranged alphabetically by title of the manuscript. The Miscellaneous and Additions folders are at the end of the series. The untitled works are identified by the first words of the piece.

II. Addresses given by Richard Malcolm Johnston, 1841-1887 The second series of the Collection are the drafts of some of Johnston's speeches. They are arranged chronologically according to a date that Johnston himself wrote on the work or one that was supplied by Ruth Johnston. (All supplied dates are written within brackets.)

III. Correspondence, 1874-1917 The third series is divided into three subseries: 1. Letters written by Richard Malcolm Johnston, March 1890-June 1890; 2. Letters received by Richard Malcolm Johnston, 1874-1898; and 3. Correspondence with the Johnston family, 1905-1917. Subseries one is arranged chronologically, subseries two is arranged alphabetically by author of the correspondence, and subseries three is arranged alphabetically by recipient of the letter. Some letters of interest are those from Samuel Clemens and Sidney Lanier.

IV. Ephemera of Richard Malcolm Johnston, 1884-1935 Series four is a group of materials that provide the researcher with a further insight into Richard Malcolm Johnston's life and hobbies. This series is divided into three subseries: 1. Written works about Richard Malcolm Johnston, 1884-1896; 2. Photographs, 1886-1894; and 3. Autograph books. The written works about Johnston include his move to Catholicism and biographies. The photographs are of himself, his wife, and his father. The autograph albums contain a variety of signatures, most notably that of Samuel Clemens.

V. Published Works, 1860-1902 The published works series is broken down into two subseries: 1. Books written by Richard Malcolm Johnston, 1860-1898; and 2. Works donated by Ruth Johnston in 1938 from Richard Malcolm Johnston's library. Most of the books are signed by the authors and are dedicated to her or her father. They are located in Special Collections. Dates include 1652, 1880-1902. Subseries 1 is arranged alphabetically by title and subseries two is arranged alphabetically by author. All books written by Johnston are cataloged and interfiled with the Maryland Imprints in Special Collections.

Ruth Johnston, the daughter of Richard Malcom Johnston, donated The Richard Malcolm Johnston Collection to the Enoch Pratt Free Library in the 1930s. The Sun, confirms Ruth's donation to the Pratt in November 1938, but made no specific mention of her father's papers. Ruth's handwriting appears throughout the Collection placing dates and places on many of the addresses and manuscripts.
